1. Introduction & Minutes from 29 November 2017

Douglas welcomed everyone to the meeting and the minutes were accepted as being an accurate account of the November meeting.

2. Matters Arising

3. Preparations of the Felling Regulations

Catherine Murdoch from the Forestry Bill Team and Jonathan Michael Taylor from FCS provided an update on the preparation work to formulate new felling regulations. The existing Forestry Act will be taken as a starting point and Catherine was keen to use existing forestry groups like the CRG and Regional Forestry Forums to help shape the new regulations.

Some of the main challenges are dealing with how to avoid progressive felling and implementation of enforcement notices. Opportunity will be taken to unhitch the obligation to restock a felled area from the need to have an illegal felling conviction.

There will be a 12 week public consultation around the summer 2018 with time constraint challenges to ensure new regulations come into force by preferred date of April 2019.

4. FGS Update

4.1 February Clearing Results

Douglas provided an update on the recent February Clearing Round. A total of £3.37m was approved covering 74 options of which £2.9m was woodland creation for 635ha. 85% was for conifer option. The March Clearing would be held next week.

4.2 Summary FGS Statistics

These are released after each clearing round and the February Statistics show £136m worth of FGS submitted applications since the scheme was opened of which £107m has been approved. This includes 18,493 ha of approved woodland creation.

Pipeline woodland creation figures are encouraging with 2,686 ha of pre submitted for 2018 and 7526 ha already for 2019.

4.3 Budget Position

The approved grant budget for 2018/19 is £46m - £40m for woodland creation and £6m for woodland management. With the strong demand for forestry grants, it is now clear that the budget for 2018/19 is likely to be fully committed by April/May.

The interest in new planting is particularly high and it is expected to approve over 9,500 hectares of woodland creation for 2018. There is also pressure on other parts of the grants budget with Central Scotland Green Network now closed for 2018 for new applications and Woodland Improvement Grant Habitat & Species and WIAT options also closed for 2018.

With clear pressure on the grants budget, there followed a general discussion on the incentivising of woodland planting and the current attractive grant rates in particular for conifers. There was a range of views expressed. Going forward, FCS will require to achieve value for money within woodland planting schemes to ensure The Scottish Government target of 10,000 ha is achieved within the £40m allocated budget.

James Nott explained the planting targets for conservancies. These are indicative annual planting amounts for Conservancies based on land availability. They are not hard Conservancy targets and will be used as a management tool to review and monitor progress against the national target.

Action March 2018/3: FCS to provide CRG members with a Woodland Creation Table showing expected outturn hectares by claim year at pre-application, submitted, approved (not paid) and grant paid.

5. Mackinnon Delivery Progress Update

James Nott gave an update on the Mackinnon Review. Internal FCS staff training events on the new Woodland Creation Applicants Guide were held in Feb/early March with external joint ICF/FCS events for the forest industry in March. These have been well attended with the key messages of the importance of stakeholder engagement and the need for 'due diligence' and of preparing a good standard of application. Members of the CRG endorsed this professional approach

Under the proposed Earned Recognition (ER) scheme, FGS applications would be fast tracked onto the public register in recognition of the professional status of applicants and the high standard of applications expected. There remains a significant amount of work to be done in developing the detail on the ER scheme including any appeals process.

6. FGS Future Plans

6.1 Woodland Creation Planning Support

Ian Cowe who has recently taken up post as G&R Development Support Officer provided an overview on the current thoughts for 'Planning Support'. In recognition that one of the barriers to woodland creation is early cash flow, FCS is looking into providing 'planning support'. This would not be new or additional grant aid with any early support deducted from future payments. Ian requested volunteers from CRG to help with this project.

Action March 2018/4: Ian Cowe to set up CRG sub group to help consider the Woodland Creation Planning Support

6.2 Standard Cost Review

Another project for 2018 is to review the standard costs with FGS. This would be limited to woodland creation and woodland improvement grant activities such as rhododendron control.

6.3 Brexit Planning

With Brexit looming, FCS is also starting to prepare a strategy for the future of FGS in relation to Brexit. There is a funding guarantee for SRDP projects where contracts are entered into before an UK exit from the EU in 2019. There is also a pledge to maintain the budget for 'farm support' until the end of the current UK Parliament, however it is not clear what counts as 'farm support'. Ministers continue to push for all Pillar 2 (and Pillar 1) to be guranteed in full.

7. Responding to Timber Supplies in Scotland

There was a forestry sawmillers meeting with Fergus Ewing in December 2017 in response to the timber supply crisis. This was particularly in south Scotland where mills were operating reduced hours due to lower timber supply. This is a complex issue with felling for windfarm development and the biomass market important strands to the supply issue. There are also clear regional differences. There is a need for more analysis of the felled area data from satellite imagery and aerial photography.

The immediate action agreed was to alleviate timber supply by providing additional flexibility in the Forest Plan approval periods. This was conditional in complying with adjacency UKFS requirements and letters were sent to Forest Plan holders.

The medium action is to finalise the prepared guidance on adjacency from last year.

Action March 2018/5: FCS to publish agreed adjacency and species guidance

8. AOB

- Brendan provided a brief overview of the passing of the Forestry Bill on 20 March 2018. This paves the way to new structural arrangements for Forestry Commission in Scotland by 1 April 2019. Ministers will now establish two agencies of the Scottish Government to deliver Ministers' forestry responsibilities. These will be Forestry and Land Scotland and Scottish Forestry. This represents a change from the planned arrangements which were for Scottish Forestry (SF) to be a dedicated Scottish Government division There will be a requirement for a Scottish Forestry Strategy by March 2019
- Jamie Farquhar raised the issue of Diffused Pollution Plans from SEPA. FCS is liaising with SEPA on the thresholds for forestry and Douglas to speak with Maida
- Jamie Farquhar raised the issue of deep peat. This is a sensitive and important issue and covers new planting and restocking scenarios. Brendan was willing to consider this further.
