Mainshill - Summary of Proposals

Mainshill is the site of a former surface mine or open cast mine. It's northern and eastern boundaries are formed by the A70 and the B7078, beyond which lies the M74. To the west the boundary is formed by woodland, which borders the Eggerton Burn, whilst to the south the site borders open into undulating moorland.

The primary objective of the land management plan is to create new, predominantly productive coniferous woodland, with a smaller component of mixed species trees as well as broadleaved element throughout; which is in keeping with the surrounding landscape. Retention of features such as the large headwall, showing exposed geological strata, highlights the underground geology which is of educational interest both in the natural landscape as well as for the sites historical setting in industrial use. Open water habitat, with the creation of further wetland areas, aim to enhance the biodiversity potential of the site.

The key considerations in producing this plan were the potential effects on: landscape, views & access, habitat and utilities. The design retained/enhance important views, areas of important open wetland habitat and minimised linear and geometric planting shapes judiciously locating broadleaves and shrubs as safety features as well as to highlight landform features.

To establish the trees the area will likely need a component of deer fencing.

Consultation and Further Information

Scottish Lowlands Forest District consulted with local neighbours in conjunction with Scottish Mines Restoration Trust (SMRT), through community council meetings whilst Central Scotland Conservancy consulted on the plan with statutory stakeholders.
